Optional Activities:

-Chain of Paper Dolls: Bring forth a chain of paper dolls. The chain represents the unity that we all have as human beings. Have students write down a charitable action that they can do to help bring about more fraternal charity in their own life, class, school, community or world.

-Food/clothes/money—bring forth some donated food, clothes or money collected to symbolize our intent to become more charitable towards our neighbours

Universal Prayers:

Response: Lord of love, hear our prayer

- For our Holy Father on earth, the Pope, all the bishops and the clergy everywhere that they may lead us to deeper faith in God and a stronger love and charity for others, we pray to the Lord
- For the priests of our Diocese, that they may continue to share their gifts with us, we pray to the Lord

- For those who are sick, lonely, discouraged, or oppressed that they may be strengthened by God's help and aided by the love and charity of these surrounding them, let us pray to the Lord

VIRTUE: LOVE

The Importance of Love:

An act of love (charity) is an expression of your unselfish love for God or an unlimited loving-kindness towards all others.

The term must not be confused or strictly interpreted as “benevolent giving”. Love is the greatest of all theological virtues. Charity has two parts: love for God above all things and love for man which includes both love for yourself and your neighbour



Faith, Hope and Love are the three theological virtues, and are the foundation of moral activity. Love is superior to all of these virtues. It also draws us closer to God and closer to one another. In order to better understand love, we need to reflect on God's love for man. We see God's love for us as being both **selfless** and **sacrificial**. The greatest demonstra-

tion of these two attributes is evident in the passion of Christ. Before his death, Jesus informs us of his wishes: “My commandment is this: love one another, just as I love you” (John 15:13). Jesus loved His disciples and humanity to the end. Love motivates the Christian to do what is right in order to bring about the happiness of God and neighbor. Love is God's gift to us in Baptism. Our model of love is Jesus.

Looks like: serving others, lending a helping hand, sacramental engagement, opening a door for someone, allowing others to go before us, taking care of what belongs to others, helping others in need, praying for our loved ones and for our enemies.

Sounds like: prayer, encouraging someone, complimenting each other, listening to other people's ideas, treating people the way we would like to be treated.

Feels like: Welcoming others, helping others with their feelings, understanding each other, including others, feels like Jesus bringing a cool drink of water on a hot day.

DEVELOPING CHARACTER THROUGH LOVE

The goal of this virtue:

- To love out our first commandment
- To deepen our relationship with Christ
- To base our actions on “unlimited kindness toward all others”
- Being selfless and sacrificial in our daily activities
- A willingness to sacrifice for someone else's well being
- Making other people a priority
- Sharing our time, talents and treasures for the benefit of others
- Forgiving others

PRAYER CENTRE IDEAS FOR LOVE



- Create a Y chart for love (charity). What does it look like, sound like and feel like?
- Post pictures of people who exemplify the virtue of love
- Display the words sacrifice and selflessness
- Post visual representations of time, treasures and talent—build on their understanding of love and charity
- Post the first commandment and have students find images/pictures of where they find love in the world

BUILDING LOVE IN OUR HOMES AND SCHOOLS

Understanding charity and the love for others is a gift that we can nurture in our children. Not only will it help children feel good about themselves, it will improve their relationship with Christ and bring true happiness in their lives. A child who learns the importance of sharing their time, treasures and talents will be better able to sympathize with those in need.

Sharing Their Time:

Children can demonstrate their love to others by sacrificing their time volunteering, baking cookies for classmates, helping others

Sharing Their Talents:

Children can share their talents with others by reading to a younger sibling, teaching a younger student to tie his/her shoes, playing the piano for the elderly, helping another student or sibling with a math problem.

Sharing Their Treasures:

Children can share their treasures by donating toys for a toy drive, using their allowance to buy a loved one a present, choosing their favourite canned goods to donate to the food bank.

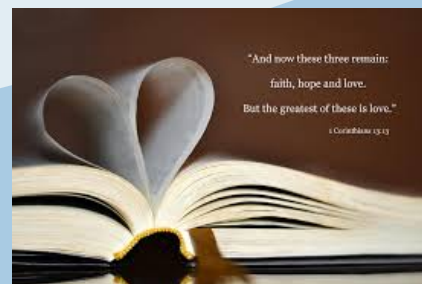

Bulletin Board Ideas:

Charity

-Large bubble letters “Charity”. Inside the letters have students illustrate actions that depict charity and love.

Charitable Donations

-Take up a collection to give to a charitable organization such as Development and Peace, Terry Fox or the Food bank. The display would be visible in the school

I Know God Loves Me Because

-Have students write on stickie notes a way that they feel God’s love. Large letters “I know God loves me because....”

Love letters from God

God has a letter written for you everyday, but it isn’t found in a cute mailbox—it is in the Bible. Students find examples of love in their life and/or from the Bible to post on bulletin board with mailbox.

And the greatest is LOVE

Jesus’ most important message while he was on earth can be summed up in one word: love. In the gospel of Paul, we can read and reflect on love:

“Be under obligation to no one—the only obligation you have is to love one another. Whoever does this has obeyed the Law. The commandments “Do not commit adultery; do not commit murder; do not steal; do not desire what belongs to someone else” - all these, and many others besides, are summed up in the lone command. “Love your neighbor as you love yourself.” If you love others you will never do them wrong; to love them is to obey the whole law. (Paul 3:8-10)

Different ways to pray—Breathing prayer

Invite students to being the habit of breathing in God’s love and breathing out anything that may be worrying them. Each time they take a breath, encourage them to feel the unconditional love of God surrounding them.

Breathe in the courage of God...breathe out any fears

Breathe in the forgiveness and strength of God...breathe out any grudges and anger

Breathe in God’s joy and peace...breathe out any sadness you may feel inside

Breathe in the love and compassion of God...breathe out any selfishness
